
NEWS REPORTS OF THE FOURTH YEAR OF

DROUGHT have eliminated the optimistic feelings I had after our December rains. The driest January in recent history has me thinking about what else I can do to reduce water use and make my garden more sustainable. Whether you have chosen to use low-water plants, or are toughing it out in the hopes of a change in weather, there are important reasons—besides just water—that might sway you in deciding to get rid of that lawn and create an innovative and interesting "New Front Yard."

I recently watched "Becoming California" on KQED (Google "KQED Becoming California" to find it online). The film highlighted the teaching and philosophy of leaders from California and elsewhere who repeated the importance of bringing nature home, the value of re-establishing habitats for native wildlife in our yards, and that—with the selection of productive plants—we can create ecological havens all around us.

I experienced this change when I traded in my lawn for a low-water landscape with plants to provide nectar and pollen for insects, seeds for birds, and a permeable surface that allows for rainfall absorption. Now, hummingbirds zip around outside, a ruby-crowned kinglet flits over the plants searching for bug snacks, and I await the return of the many butterflies and native bees that dined here last summer.

Just outside your window is a place where you can discover and become a steward of nature. You can create an urban ecosystem from a bare strip of







earth or a patch of lawn that will start a conversation with Mother Nature.

Not ready for a full-scale renovation? Just add a new, beneficial plant to your mix to see what new wildlife it brings. We've got a whole new list of 35 low-water plants you've (probably) never heard of, which are compatible with last year's New Front Yard series. More California natives—about 40 percent of the list—lead the way, as well as hummingbird-attracting plants, those known to be visited by important pollinators and beneficial insects, and of course, a few from the desert with the ability to survive with no summer irrigation.

UPDATED DATABASE

LOOK UP LOW-WATER PLANTS WITH WUCOLS!

THANKS TO THE UC DAVIS CALIFORNIA CENTER FOR UR-BAN HORTICULTURE (CCUH), which secured funding from multiple industry partners as well as the California Department of Water Resources, there's an online resource that is a quick way to learn more about water needs of plants sold by nurseries throughout the state of California. It's called WUCOLS, which stands for Water Use Classification of Landscape Species (http://ucanr.edu/sites/WUCOLS).

Because only about 1% of plants have been scientifically researched to determine their exact water needs, the WUCOLS list incorporates the extensive field knowledge of 36 horticulturists from throughout the state whose experience has allowed them to evaluate the water use of over 3,500 plants; this knowledge is now documented within the fourth edition of the WUCOLS online database.

Once you start digging around this list we think you'll find a multitude of low-water plants that you've never heard of, but will want to try. The plants illustrated here are just a few of our favorites that we'll have available at our spring plant sales.



ANN IS A MEMBER OF THE FRIDAY NATIVE PLANT GARDENER VOLUNTEER TEAM that cares for the Arboretum GATEway Garden and Putah Creek Parkway. As a native plant enthusiast, she jumped at the chance to join the native gardening training in fall of 2013. She and the other 25 volunteers on the team have played a key role in the planting and developing of the Arboretum GATEway Garden, restoring the Putah Creek Parkway, and creating the community-built mural that connects the two green spaces.

After retiring from careers in Texas in 2010, Ann and her husband Jim chose to relocate to Davis for the mild climate and the college town community. Ann developed her love of native plants as a volunteer at the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center in Austin, and she has brought that appreciation with her to California. As a former history major, she appreciates how "native plants tell about the history and culture of a place."

After working in the Arboretum GATEway Garden for over a year, Ann feels a special connection to the garden she helped build. Knowing the history of the site and its transformation, and observing how the garden ties to the community in such a strong way, keep her motivated to stay involved.
